Our GED graduations in the DOP rose by 44% in 2001, a reflection of the efforts of many individuals to assure that whenever possible students working on their

GED in 2001 could graduate before the test changed. Well

GRADUATION HIGHLIGHTS ACROSS DOP

• RUTHERFORD CORRECTIONAL CENTER:

Rutherford Correctional Center had fifty-five inmates who attained their GED in the year 2001. Out of the fifty-five only three are still at this unit. Graduation exercises for these three will be held at Isothermal Community College on June 14, 2002.

• COLUMBUS CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION:

Columbus Correctional Institution awarded forty-seven inmates their GED Certificates in 2001. Thirty-five others were awarded Vocational Certificates in one of three areas: Brickmasonry, Basic Heating, Air and Refrigeration, and Plumbing. Seven GED Certificates have also been awarded so far in 2002. The host Southeastern Community College hope to soon offer Human Relations Development studies to inmates as part of their transitional case management.

JOHNSTON CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION:

On Wednesday, April 24, 2002, Johnston Correctional Institution held a graduation ceremony for the vocational programs in the following trade and technical areas: Air Conditioning, Heating, Refrigeration (12), Electrical/ Electronics Technology (17), Electronic Servicing Technology (11), Food Service Technology (19). Horticulture Technology (13), Masonry (11), Office Systems Technology (10), and Plumbing (12). Thirty-eight graduates were also honored for maintaining straight A's throughout their studies, while 53 were recognized for perfect attendance.

• NC CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION FOR WOMEN: NCCIW held their Spring Graduation on April 5, 2002. Ninety-three students qualified for graduation while 79 students graduated in Vocational Programs and GED. As Ms. Sandra Winters delivered her thought provoking speech and poem inspiring graduates to be "phenomenal women", everyone was spellbound. Family and friends showed great support by record setting attendance. The NCCIW Shaw Graduation will also be held in the Chapel of the Nameless Woman on June 4, 2002. Fifteen students will be receiving AA or BA degrees. Senator Ellie Kinnaird will address the graduates, families, staff, and administration. The NCCIW Gospel Choir, directed by Ms. Michelle Montague, will sing a musical selection for our listening pleasure.

• SAMPSON CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION:

Eleven students graduated on April 11th from Sampson Correction Institution who completed the Character Education Class. The students developed a class code of ethics and Programs Supervisor Hameed Shareef offered closing remarks.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AT PASQUOTANK

Two instructional programs are provided by the College of the Albemarle in Elizabeth City: Basic Skill/GED and Vocational Training. Three vocational courses are offered in Carpentry, Electrical wiring and HVAC. Food Service Technology is also offered to train students in food preparation in the restaurant industry. Currently, the basic program has 46 students enrolled and historically, COA has had one of the highest percentages of graduates of any GED program in the state. The College of Albemarle plans to graduate 28 vocational students and 44 GED students in the graduation exercise scheduled for July 19, 2002. In other news, PCI has recently begun publishing a 12-page newsletter featuring a "Student of the Month" and original works by some of our students. The newsletter has been well received by both students and staff.

CULINARY SKILLS UTILIZED AT CALEDONIA

The food service technology program remains one of the most successful programs at Caledonia. It provides valuable knowledge and experience in the culinary arts to all inmates enrolled. On April 17, 2002, Mr. Hunsucker and his students prepared and presented the food and refreshments in a highly professional manner at our volunteer banquet. Both our staff and volunteers present were impressed and very complementary. Our food service technology class has trained inmates for the more specialized jobs in the kitchen. Additionally, this vocation provides the inmates with a marketable skill which will be necessary to have a successful reentry into society.

BLACK HISTORY OBSERVED AT MORRISON CI

Inmates assigned to the Education Department at MCI presented a Black history Observance Program "A Walk Through Time in Black History" highlighting precolonial to present day historical events. Morrison's choir, the Freedom Singers, sang a selection of spiritual and gospel music. Refreshments were provided for program participants. OTHER NEWS AT MCI:

• ESL inmates recently observed Cinco De Mayo as they celebrated their heritage and enjoyed eating a variety of Spanish foods. Cinco De Mayo, an annual celebration which marked the end of French control of any land in Mexico, begins on May 4th through May 6th.

• MCI Education Department participated in the

McGraw-Hill Spring 2002 research project called "A Validation Study of the TABE and GED Tests". Twentynine inmates participated in this research project which assessed written language mechanics and written composition skills. The Tests of Adult Basic Education and General Educational Diploma are commonly used educational tests in the community college system and the Division of Prisons.

ALBEMARLE INCREASES COURSE OFFERINGS

The Albemarle Correctional Institution has increased educational offerings in partnership with Stanly Community College to include the following: Computer Applications (15 students), 17 Occupation Extension Courses (beginning May 20th), Air Conditioning, Heating and Refrigeration Technology (with 18 students), and an evening HRD program. A Spanish class was also established to prepare students to work with Hispanic co-workers. In other news, an education website is being developed for Stanly Community College with a link to the education programs at Albemarle Institution. Also, Ms. Tiffany Phillips, a participant in the Pfeiffer University Bonner Connection Community Partner Program, is tutoring ABE students at the institution weekly. ACI hosted an Education Achievement Recognition Ceremony on May 10th.
