# Hot off the Press!!

**FCI** education newsletter staff published the first edition entitled, *The Connection*, in January. The newsletter's format is similar to that of a typical newspaper including world news, U.S. news, local (FCI) news, editorial and opinion pieces, sports, and holiday information. In addition, inmates also address transition and parenting issues while incorporating reading skills with word searches and puzzles. The newsletter staff meets weekly and expects to publish every three months.



Airlie Green, an ESP/Reading teacher at FCI, traveled to China in November as an International Reading Association representative. She met with other IRA members to learn about reading practices and strategies in China and was featured in the recent January/February 2007 Correction News bulletin.

**FCI** is anticipating the addition of a new vocational program, Computer Information Technology, which will be offered beginning August 2007. Inmates will commit to the one-year program and receive a diploma.

**Foothills Minimum Custody Unit** has successfully graduated three groups of trained dogs in the New Leash on Life Program. To date, all nine dogs have been adopted by loving homes and the program continues to be beneficial for the dogs and the inmates that care and train them. This program is associated with the Friends for Animals in Burke County.

The **Horticulture** program recently held a vegetable plant sale which included a variety of plants, such as cabbage (green and red), broccoli, cauliflower, and ornamental foliage. The sale was such a huge success; the classes began planning a spring flower sale for April.

Finally, the **FCI** education department is anticipating a graduation ceremony on May 18. The staff does an excellent job preparing for the event and typically received rave reviews from those who have attended other graduation ceremonies.

## **Fountain Correctional Center for Women**


**Fountain Correctional Center for Women** held its spring GED graduation on Thursday, May 10, 2007. Fountain's Educational Department, in partnership with Edgecombe Community College, continues their mission to prepare students with educational/vocational opportunities that will enhance their future and career goals. Twenty-five burgundy caps and gowns were purchased and used for the first time in the Fall 2006 Graduation Ceremony with 20 inmates receiving their GED. A total of 62 have received a GED since July 2006.



Seven students enrolled in the ABE program have progressed to the GED curriculum this year. As of January 2006, the following classes have had students receive certificates: Horticulture (20 completed), Job Readiness (220 day/night students completed), Home Companion Aide (60 completed), Simple Computer (60 completed), Office Systems Technology (11 completed), and Customer Service (15 completed).



As DOC gears into "**TRANSITIONING**" inmates back into the community, FCCW has added a second Pre-Employment Job Readiness class to assist with the gainful employment upon release. This will allow over 360 inmates a year to participate in this class.



Fountain's Horticulture class has decorated the gym for various inmate functions, Christmas Dinner, GED/Vocational Graduation Ceremonies, and the Transition Expo. They have had several plant sales this spring to raise money to purchase new seedlings for their fall projects.

# McCAIN CORRECTIONAL HOSPITAL RE-ENTRY GRADUATION

On Tuesday, November 14, 2006, McCain Correctional Hospital conducted their fifth graduation for the Chaplaincy Re-Entry Program with a banquet. Family and guests shared a wonderful meal with the inmate graduates, staff and volunteers. Mr. Michael Conwell, guest speaker for the event, followed the meal with an inspirational challenge to the graduates to continue to building upon their positive accomplishments.

During the program's 18 sessions, 21 volunteers from local community agencies answered questions and provided information on various community-based programs and benefits designed to reduce the stress of transitioning back into their community. Discussions included Relationships and Parenting, Medical Insurance, Job Interviews, Resumes, Credit, Budget, Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Motor Vehicles, Employment Security Commission, Support Groups, and Spiritual Concerns. Inmates were encouraged to identify important realities which contributed to their incarceration and resolve issues that would prevent re-occurrence.



Participation in the program was voluntary with two requirements, a close release date and a desire for self-improvement. The program was a success with a graduation class of 19 inmates; recognition of three honor students and half of the class was recognized for perfect attendance.

#### "An Hour of Empowerment"

In honor of Women's History Month, **NCCIW** hosted an "Hour of Empowerment" on March 24, 2007, to showcase the talents of the Cosmetology Program. The objectives of this event were primarily to enhance the knowledge of our program to potential cosmetologist as judges, to increase the possibility of the offender being gainfully employed upon release, to encourage others to participate in the cosmetology program, to demonstrate examples of positive self-esteem, and ultimately to transition the inmate successfully back into society as a productive citizen.



The program began at 2:00 p.m., and the last showing ended at 7:00 p.m. Extra hours were held to allow for all who signed up from each dormitory to attend. The showcase included some 24 models and 12 stylist teams. Models were chosen from the entire population and all were given an equal opportunity to be selected. The stylists were students from the Cosmetology class.

The stylist teams were responsible for two models and they were judged in five categories;
